The RSC, the Université de Montréal (UdeM), Acfas and the Fonds de recherche du Québec are proud to host jointly this day of reflection, <u>Reception for New Members and Discussion on the Future and Challenges of Doing Research in French in Canada</u> which takes place on the UdeM campus on Friday, May 12, 2023.

In the afternoon, a panel of experts will launch a discussion on the challenges facing Quebec researchers and Francophone minority researchers in Canada outside Quebec.

DISCUSSION ON THE FUTURE AND CHALLENGES OF DOING RESEARCH IN FRENCH IN CANADA The Future and Challenges of French Language Research in Canada

Doing research in French in Canada presents three separate challenges. The first challenge is common throughout the global francophone community. What future can be expected for French scientific research and French literary and artistic works, considering the omnipresence of the English language worldwide? The other two challenges are specific to Canada, but a distinction must be drawn between working in French in Quebec and doing so in a minority situation within English Canada, whether as a researcher or as a specialist in arts or literature. This third challenge is not as well understood and – in addition to the issue surrounding the status of French in a minority setting – it also raises the issue of the relationship between majority Francophones in Quebec and minority Francophones elsewhere in Canada. Moreover, the Canadian Francophone community is evolving and must address the issues of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) among its different subgroups. This workshop will have two main focuses: the current situation and the future outlook of French language scholarly works.

During the first part of the workshop, a summary of the results of the Forum on Science in French held by the FRQ and Acfas in April 2023 will be presented. This will be followed by a session on the specific issue of conducting scholarly activities in French in a minority setting in several disciplinary fields: social sciences, humanities, arts, health and life sciences, and natural and applied sciences. Speakers will identify the challenges and issues associated with these various fields of knowledge.

The second part of the workshop focuses on the future outlook of scientific and cultural knowledge mobilization and the specific issue, which can no longer be ignored, of EDI within the Francophone community.

Tanja Niemann is Executive Director of the scholarly journal dissemination platform erudit.org, one of Canada's leading digital research infrastructures in the humanities and social sciences field. She has a background in communication and media studies.



FANIE PELLETIER

Dr. Fanie Pelletier is a Professor in the Department of Biology, Université de Sherbrooke. She is a Fellow of the College of the Royal Society of Canada and she received several awards, including the prestigious NSERC E.W.R. Steacie Early Researcher Award in Science and Engineering. Her research focuses on the evolutionary ecology of vertebrates, including on life-history evolution,

reproductive strategies, and population dynamics. She has used innovative methods to demonstrate how human activities affect wild populations. She is also a member of the Terrestrial Mammal Specialist Subcommittee for the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COSEWIC) and Co-Editor in chief of FACETS, the official journal of the Royal Society of Canada's Academy of Science.



JOËLLE PINEAU

Dr. Joëlle Pineau is a Professor at the McGill School of Computer Science, where she co-directs the Reasoning and Learning Lab. She is a researcher at Mila and holds a Canada.



CAROLINE QUACH-THANH

Dr. Caroline Quach-Thanh is a Professor in the Departments of Microbiology, Infectious Diseases & Immunology and Pediatrics at the Université de Montréal. She is the Infection Prevention and Control Officer at CHU Sainte-Justine, where she is also a microbiologist-infectiologist. Dr. Quach is a clinician-scientist and holds the Canada Research Chair, Tier 1, in Infection

Prevention and Control. Her research focuses on the prevention of nosocomial and vaccinepreventable infections, particularly in medically vulnerable populations.
